Simple, practical ways to limit cross traffic in the plant It's not practical to expect that all trailers will be cleaned and disinfected prior to delivery Plant specific – one size might not fit all

- 1. Get the Bill of Lading to/from the office
 - a. Runner / manpower solutions
 - i. Plastic boot and Tote combined
 - ii. Clean / dirty line at back of the truck has to be
 - b. Engineering solutions
 - i. Get bill of lading back to producer electronically
 - 1. Electronic signature?
- 2. Clean dirty line / line of separation where there is only one way traffic across that line
 - a. At the trailer the end of the truck
 - b. One way traffic from the end of the truck
 - c. Plant personnel to take pigs away from clean dirty line
- 3. Get the driver to the back of the truck
 - a. Side door
 - b. Someplace needed for driver to leave disposable boots, coveralls, etc.
- 4. Slow and fatigued
 - a. Multiple sleds for cleaning
 - i. Dedicated unloading sleds
 - b. Clean boots and gloves
 - c. Communicate the need for these trailers to be washed
- 5. Unloading dock wash
 - a. Last 10 feet
 - b. Location of water source needs to be close to the docks for worker safety
 - c. Infrared heaters or some heat source in winter
 - d. Wash organic matter; questionable use of disinfectant
- 6. Plant personnel clothes, boots, cleanliness before going home to own pigs from plants
- 7. Don't rely on boot washes
- 8. Is catwalk practical? Safe?
 - a. Snow removal may be a problem
 - b. C&D of catwalk?
 - c. Obstruction for back up?
 - d. Need majority of trailers with side doors
- 9. Truck wash at the plant as a profit center or surcharge
 - a. Transport to/from finishers, not to use as a method for transport back from sow farm
